### Tallulah Bankhead

(1902-1968)

Tallulah Bankhead was a witty actress for many years on Broadway and in Hollywood, known for her deep husky voice, forceful personality, flamboyant style, bawdy disposition and many affairs. Once when she encountered a former lover she had not seen in years she said, "I thought I told you to wait in the car." Her last word was "bourbon." A southerner from Alabama who rebelled against the stereotype of the belle, she had U.S. Senators in her family and her father was Speaker of the U.S. House from 1936 to 1940:

I'd rather be strongly wrong than weakly right.

I'm the foe of moderation, the champion of excess.

Only good girls keep diaries. Bad girls don't have time.
