Josh Billings

(1818-1885)

Josh Billings (Henry Wheeler Shaw) is a far distant second in stature to Mark Twain among the more provincial 19th-century humorists such as Artemus Ward and Petroleum V. Nasby. Three members of his family served in the U.S. House of Representatives. Billings joshed and wrote and performed on stage like Twain in a folksy voice, using dialect, slang, phonetic spelling, epigrams and wit. He was such a common man his embalmer tossed his guts into a gulch for dogs and fish bait.
