Adlai Stevenson

(1900-1965)

Adlai Ewing Stevenson II was one of the most articulate and witty political figures in American history since Benjamin Franklin. The graceful and scholarly Stevenson was revered by liberals and became the most admired Democrat, influencing the young John F. Kennedy. In 1952 and 1956 he ran for President of the United States against Dwight Eisenhower, who in the public mind had defeated the Nazis and won World War II. During his campaigns Stevenson was caricatured as an "Egghead" intellectual, a stereotype then associated with academics sympathetic to Communism. In the movie *Dr. Strangelove* he is the model for the liberal President of the United States when a nuclear war ignites and is portrayed as a weakling. To the contrary, in real life Adlai Stevenson prevailed in an eloquently forceful confrontation with the Soviet ambassador to the United Nations over the Cuban missile crisis—televised worldwide.

It was always accounted a virtue in a man to love his country. With us now it is something more than a virtue. It is a necessity.

When an American says that he loves his country, he means not only that he loves the New England hills, the prairies glistening in the sun, the wide and rising plains, the great mountains, and the sea. He means that he loves an inner air, an inner light in which freedom lives and in which a man can draw the breath of self-respect.

Who shall say that the American dream is ended? For myself, I believe that all we have done upon this continent is but a prelude.

We Americans are suckers for good news.

FREEDOM

A hungry man is not a free man.

A free society is one where it is safe to be unpopular.

All progress has resulted from people who took unpopular positions.

The sound of tireless voices is the price we pay for the right to hear the music of our own opinions.

Because we believe in the free mind we are also fighting those who, in the name of anti-Communism, would assail the community of freedom itself.

DEMOCRACY

Self-criticism is the secret weapon of democracy, and the candor and confession are good for the public soul.

They pick a president, and then for four years they pick on him.

NEWSPAPERS

The sources of information are the springs from which democracy drinks.

Newspaper editors are men who separate the wheat from the chaff, and then print the chaff.

A free society means a society based on free competition and there is no more important competition than competition in ideas, competition in opinion. This form of competition is essential to the preservation of a free press.

Our press may make a million mistakes without doing itself permanent harm so long as its proprietors are steadfast in their adherence to truth.

Accuracy is to a newspaper what virtue is to a lady, but a newspaper can always print a retraction.

Those who corrupt the public mind are just as evil as those who steal from the public purse.
